PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 28 August 2024

The meeting on was attended by 6 councillors and the clerk, plus 4 members of the public.

Planning:

Application 24/502123: Land north and south of A2 Dunkirk "Winterbourne fields" to build 1,800 homes in phased delivery concluding in major changes to the Gate services A2 junction.

The Parish council agreed the final wording of the objection to this development to be submitted before the deadline of 31st August.

Application 24/500531: 2 Waterham Cottages Retrospective application for change of use of land for new outbuilding and car parking

The householder attended to explain to councillors the circumstances of the application to which the council had previously objected. New information has been provided, hence the revisit. On this occasion the council voted by majority to offer no further adverse comments.

Cleve Hill Solar panel installation: Councillors attended an open day on the site 13th August. All agreed it is very, very large. The group met with members of the management team and one of the ecologists employed at the site. Further dates for members of the public to visit will be forthcoming in the autumn. Anyone interested please contact Councillor Donna Waters.

Neighbourhood watch:

We await Swale council's contractor for removal of the asbestos, dumped on the Wey Street slip road. Peter Wilson reported that parishioners have been in touch with him regarding large HGVs coming down our lanes and downing overhanging vegetation. Branches on the road and other dangers can be reported immediately via the KCC website.

Speedwatch: Volunteers are still needed to join this group.

The online registration and training is straightforward (I have done it!) Please contact the clerk.

Neighbourhood plan:

Councillor Kim Wakes gave an update on recent activity please see the separate article below. A number of tasks have been allocated including an application for funding a housing needs assessment. Councillors agreed to fund the purchase of biodiversity mapping documents for £34. The next public meeting will be held on 16th October, 7.15pm Red Lion.

A299 Thanet Way, Hernhill

(PROHIBITION OF DRIVING) THE ROAD TRAFFIC REGULATION ACT 1984

TEMPORARY ORDER OCTOBER 2024

Kent County Council works.

To allow resurfacing works to be carried out, Kent County Council has made an Order to temporarily prohibit through traffic on part of A299 Thanet Way, Hernhill.

A closure is planned from 11th October 2024, with estimated completion by 15th October 2024, between the hours of 20:00 and 05:00, or where stated on a valid Permit (GE70557581162-03 - Kent County Council). The scheduled dates may vary for these works with appropriate signage displayed on site and the works will be displayed on <u>One.Network</u>

A299 Thanet Way, Hernhill will be closed coastbound only, in the vicinity of Dargate Services, from Plumpudding Lane overbridge, to the extent indicated by signs and barriers on site.

The closure is required for the safety of the public and workforce while resurfacing works are undertaken by Kent County Council.

The alternative route for any through traffic is via A2 Brenley Corner Roundabout, A2 Boughton Bypass, A2050 Harbledown Bypass, London Road, A290 Whitstable Road, St Thomas Hill, Whitstable Road, Blean Common, Honey Hill, Pean Hill, Clapham Hill, A2990 Thanet Way and A299 Thanet Way.





HISTORIC HERNHILL

Just six weeks into the First World War, Hernhill was shaken by the loss of two village men in the greatest naval catastrophe of the war.

On September 22, The submarine U9 sank three obsolete and slow British Cruisers in just 90 minutes off the Dutch coast, HMS Cressy, HMS Hogue and HMS Aboukir, all from the Chatham Division. Many of the 1,459 men and boys killed were from Kent and memorial services were held at parish churches around the county.





Grieving family and friends were at St Michael's to mourn Stoker First Class Charles Edgar Arnold of the Cressy aged 26, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Arnold of Oakwell Cottages, the weatherboard house at the bottom of the dip, and Petty Officer William Edward Harvey of HMS Aboukir, who lived at 2 Staplestreet.

The Faversham News reported that the Arnolds were a family who had been in the village for generations and of the five sons, two were in the Navy, and another two in the Royal Garrison Artillery. Petty Officer Harvey was a man of "high character and heroic spirit and leaves a mother and wife to lament his loss." Although Stoker Arnold's parents lived at Oakwell, the Faversham News reported that he "belonged to Staplestreet" so the two heroes would have been near neighbours, perhaps enjoying one another's company at the Three Horseshoes. "The service was conducted by the Vicar, Rev. A. Clark, who paid glowing tributes to the character and heroic spirit of the two men. The Dead March (in Saul) and Mendelssohn's Funeral March were impressively played by Miss Foreman at the commencement and close of the service."

Both men are commemorated on the War Memorial in the corner of the churchyard, opposite the Red Lion and on the Chatham Naval Memorial.

This month's edition of Bygone Kent includes my 12-page article on the 'Livebait Squadron' Cruisers and the effects of their loss on the county and on First Lord of the Admiralty Winston Churchill, who was widely criticised. There is an excellent book on the subject, The Coal Black Sea, by former Naval Officer and journalist Stuart Heaver, from Whitstable which is available from bookshops and online.

HERNHILL CHURCH

It still feels strange writing about new beginnings in the last quarter of the year. New beginnings were something I associated with a New Year, until I moved to the UK. I learned September is a month mostly associated with new beginnings. There are probably various reasons for this. But I will stick to the one that is obvious – the school calendar.

After a long summer break, vacations and lazy days, schools re-open. Children and young people return to school (I can't wait for my weekly visits into the schools for collective worship). Others are starting a new year group, while others are starting a new school. In the home, it feels like life starts settling into a routine. A new beginning brings with it new opportunities. Even if it's returning to a familiar school, job or normal routines, new beginnings also bring new energy. It's both exciting and challenging.

The meaning of new beginnings varies from person to person. Sometimes, with context too. But what does the Bible say about new beginnings? The Bible offers encouragement and advice for new beginnings.

For example, one can start is wherever they are in the context of Christenings and fresh starts with Jesus, the Bible says, therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: The old has gone, the new is here! (2 Corinthians 5.17). Perseverance and Joy are important attitudes to new beginnings, rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus (1 Thessalonians 5.8). God doesn't remember our past failure. When one sets off for a fresh start, He starts with them. Forget the former things; do not dwell on the past. See, I am doing a new thing! Now it springs up; do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland (Isaiah 43.18-19).

In the same way that our schools and families are preparing for the beginning of the new beginnings. The church in our benefice is also preparing itself for some new beginnings. This includes:

Kingsquad: An afterschool club in Boughton and Dunkirk School. Through fun activities, games and crafts, children will explore bible stories, Christian values and ask questions.

Soul Space: A monthly gathering every first Sunday of the month at 6pm St Barnabas. It offers an informal space to explore the Christian faith with conversation, prayer and contemporary music. Whether you are taking first steps to discover your own thoughts about faith, or seeking to grow by talking to others, you are welcome.

Wednesday Evening Prayer: 5pm at St Michael's Hernhill. A set service with readings, prayers and reflections to help us process all that may be happening in our lives. There will also be Holy Communion on some days.

These are just some of the new beginnings in the Church Life. Look at the detailed schedule for our new Sunday service pattern.

Hilary died in 2018 aged 46 and is buried in Hernhill churchyard.
